Lamar H. Cramer, 79, of Ephrata, PA, passed away on Friday, September 9, 2016 at the Susquehanna Valley Health & Rehabilitation Center, Columbia, PA, following a short illness.

Born in Lancaster and a lifelong area resident, he was the son of the late Harold J. and Helen M. Labezius Cramer and the husband of the late Hilda M. Johnson Cramer.

A proud Marine, Lamar had served in the United States Marine Corps, stationed in Camp Lejeune, NC, from September 1955 until September 1975 as a Staff Sergeant with Ammunition Tech and Explosive Ordinance Disposal. He served two tours of duty in Vietnam. He then worked for Goodhart & Sons Inc. from 1978 until 1989 and lastly with CR Fiendly's from 1989 to 1999, when he retired.

He was a member of the Marine Corps Assoc., the 3rd Marine Division Assoc., VFW Post #5965 in Ephrata, American Legion Post # 945, Vietnam Veterans Assoc. Post # 30, Lancaster Military Order of Devil Dogs, and the NRA. Lamar also was a volunteer at Jason's Woods for over 10 years.

Lamar is survived by his sister Elaine Ellen, (Hugh) Greco of Panama City Beach, FL and several nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by a

brother Harold J. Cramer and a sister, Josetta Cramer.
